## Latest official data on passenger numbers in East Anglia

The table below offers a useful snapshot of volumes of passengers using the stations on the routes where MARPA has a direct interest. This footfall data is taken from the statistics produced annually by the Office of Rail & Road (ORR). The data is not available broken down by route or service – so for the larger stations in the table, the aggregated figures on their own do not say anything directly about volumes of passengers using the lpswich – Cambridge or lpswich – Peterborough services. A better indicator of passenger numbers on the two services is provided by the data for the smaller stations.

Whilst the actual volumes are interesting – well over 11 million passengers using Cambridge station in 2016/17, for instance – the trends captured in the two final columns are probably more useful, since they show the extent to which passenger numbers using particular stations are growing over time. So to take the example of Dullingham, the data shows a 47% increase in passengers over the five years between 2012 and 2017, but a drop in numbers of nearly 12% between 2016 and 2017. Against a five year average growth across all East Anglian stations of 22.4%, five intermediate stations on the Ipswich – Cambridge route have exceeded that average whilst only one, Elmswell, has figures suggesting very minimal overall growth. In the final column, the figures in red indicate a fall in passenger numbers between 2016 and 2017 at three stations, statistically insignificant in the case of Stowmarket, perhaps less insignificant at Dullingham and Thurston.

Like all relatively complex information, the data begs a host of questions. But just using the data for the six smaller stations on this route – excluding Bury and Stowmarket as well as Cambridge and Ipswich – the overall 5 year uplift is 40%. So it is reasonable to argue that the trends, often linked to substantial and ongoing new housing developments at many points along the route, point to a need for a more frequent service serving passengers using this key corridor. And with the prospect of East – West Rail now on the horizon, the case for more trains linking Ipswich and Cambridge has surely never been stronger.
