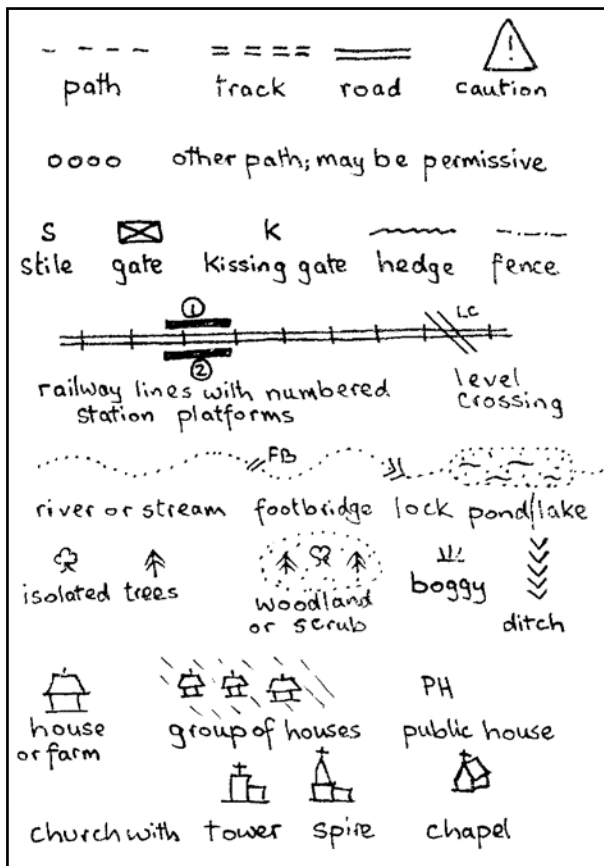


Key to landscape features

ROUTE FINDING

You will need a basic understanding of maps and the ability to follow them. The walks can be followed in either direction, but if you go in the same way as the arrows, you won't have to turn the map around to fit the landscape. Parts of the Gipping Valley River Path may be flooded in exceptionally wet weather, so you may need to find an alternative route. Make sure you have a good map of the local area.

TIME

Allow about 2½ hours for the Gipping route; about 3 hours via Badley, but add on time for refreshments, visiting nature reserves and churches.

REFRESHMENTS

Plenty of choice in Needham Market and Stowmarket.

BADLEY CHURCH

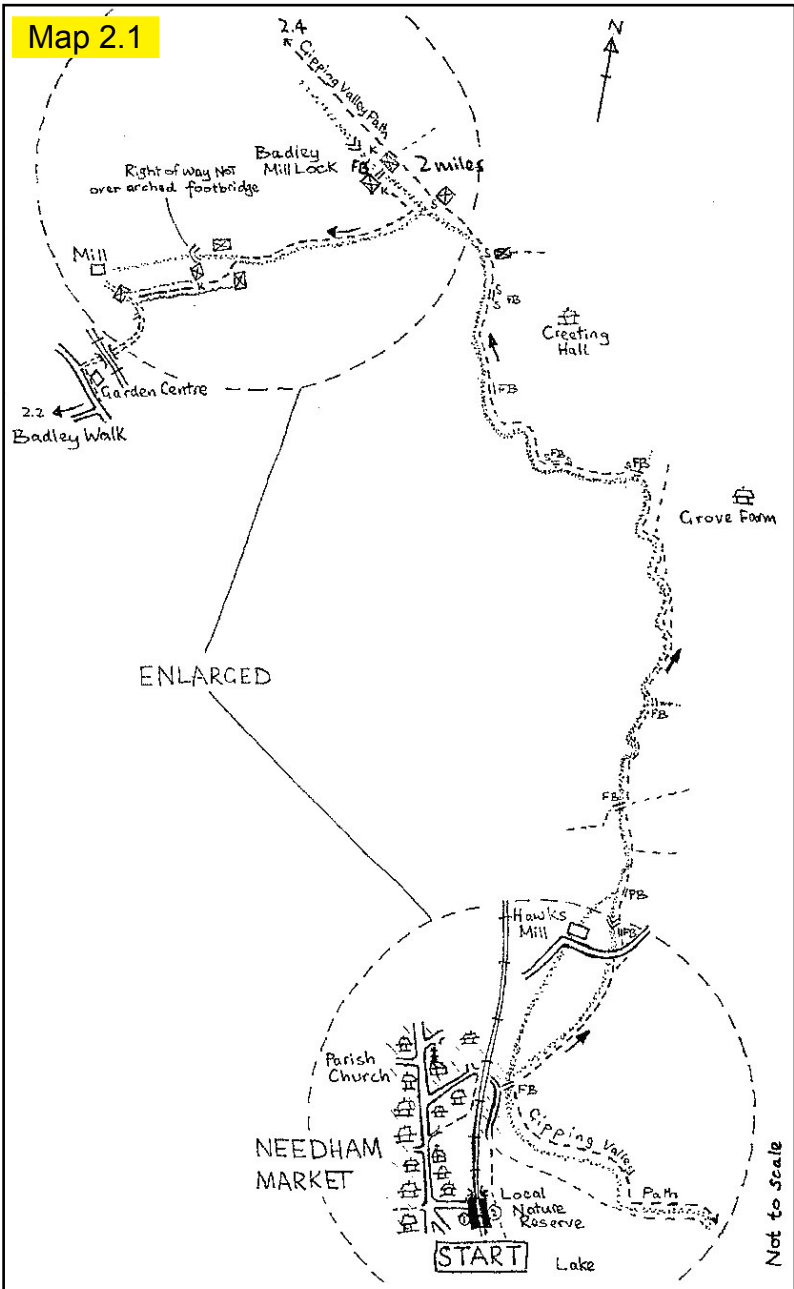
The Gipping Valley River Path provides an easily followed route, much of it along the towpath of the former navigation. Many old mills and the remains of locks often enhance the scene, but north of Badley Mill lock (TM 074568) walkers may prefer to deviate from the industrialised section of the canal to visit Badley church, idyllically located in remote countryside. Elizabeth I may have ridden along Badley Walk when visiting the nearby hall.

Combs Wood, recorded in Domesday, is now a Suffolk Wildlife Trust reserve of great interest, noted for oxlips, orchids and wood anemones. Charcoal burners help maintain traditional management. Attractive vernacular buildings line Needham's main street, where the church of St Mary has a spectacular late 15th century timber roof.

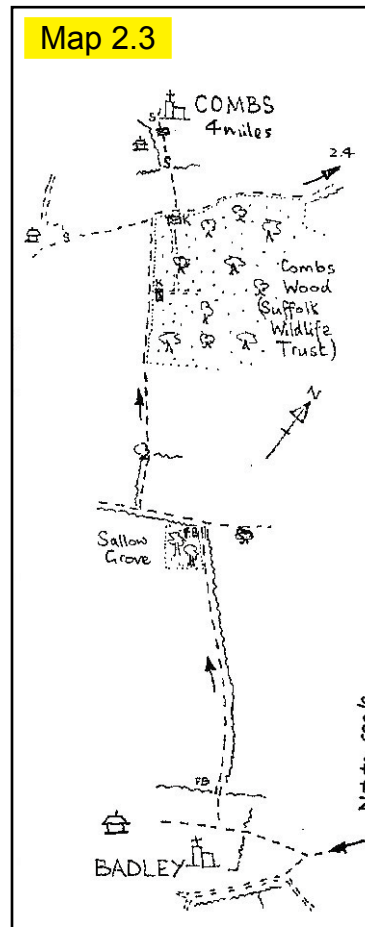
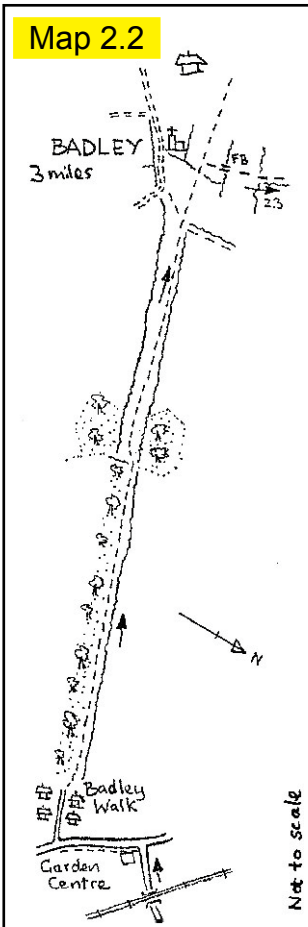
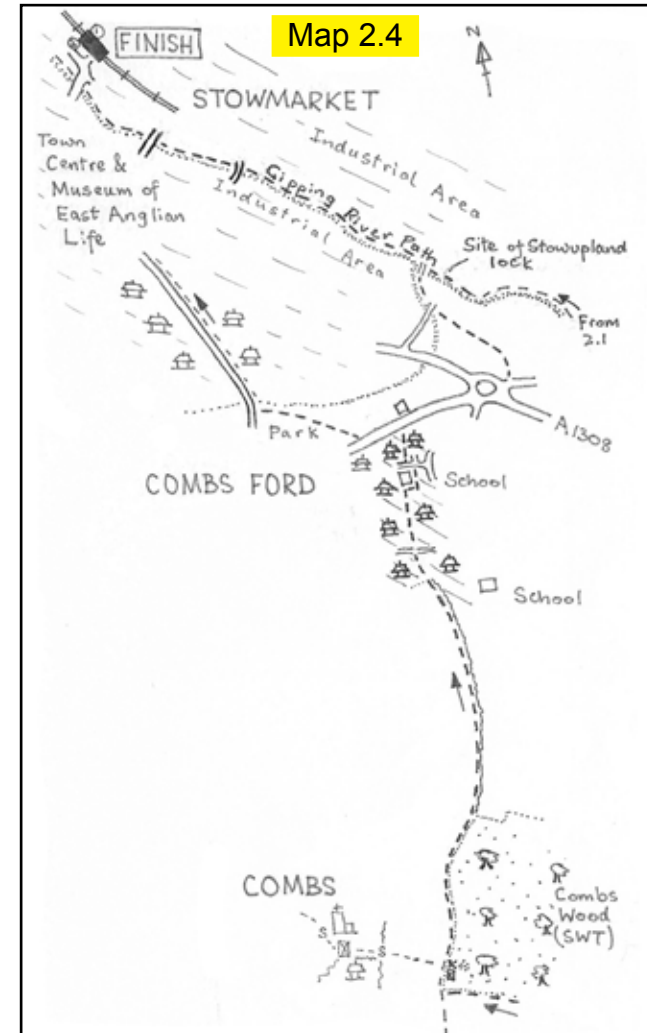
Stowmarket is the home of the Museum of East Anglian Life.
